The small boat fleet Captains, Race Committee, and Regatta Committee met on Sun. March 9th and produced two 1968 race schedules.

Sun. March 16 we met again with the smallboat Skippers and voted on which schedule to use. The schedule adopted follows the plan used in previous years, with minor changes to fit the 1968 calendar. We will have one throw out in the seven race evening series.

By unanimous vote, we will use the Portsmouth Handicap System for

handicap races. This system is computed annually from national

averages of performances and is adjusted accordingly.

The 1968 handicaps for the local fleet are, Star 82, Thistle 83,
Fire Ball 87, Lightning 87, Rhodes Bantam 97, and OK Dinghy 97.

The formula to figure your corrected time is the elapsed time, times 100, divided by your handicap number.

Although the small boat race schedule is complete, accepted and (approved ?), there may be a delay in printing, so keep in mind your first race is Sun, 12, May, 10:00AM and is Spring series 1&2 and Pomeroy #1.

To properly conduct a small-boat race, the Race Committee boat should have five adults aboard and the crash boats should have at

least two adults aboard.
