The MORC International Regatta, August 18th to 24th, will be a big event for our boating season. The Committees and Club staff have plans for accommodating the group so as to reduce or eliminate any inconvenience to members. The MORC sailors are our guests and each of us should welcome them as such. This is an international event which will be widely publicized by

"Yachting Magazine" and the local media. We would like everyone to know we are not only the biggest, but also the best Yacht Club on the Great Lakes.

The house staff would appreciate it if the diners would fill out the comment cards on the tables. The cards are useful for eveluating service and quality. Each one is considered. We also review the "cute" comments for originality, but, so far, have found nothing new. The one to have the Commodore do the cooking was a REAL looser!

Security efforts are continually monitored. Watch Rey activity, gate security and physical improvements are in place. An additional section of fence has been placed on the east wall. Plans have been made for additional security during the MORC Nationals.


To miminize equipment and fuel costs, Commodore Sheeran has asked that consideration be given to securing a "golf" type transport cart for workmen and security guards. This would be quick and efficient transportation and certainly not as costly as running pick-up trucks. This project is underway.

At the last Board Meeting, authorization was given for expenditure of funds to place a finish surface on the main parking lot. quotations are being solicited and that work will soon be done. Our landscaping ground cover around the lighthouse. Signs for parking and security will so be in place.

The flagship mast has been strengthened, a sum log installed and a first aid kit purchased and placed aboard. Continued maintenance takes place. I have asked Mrs. Haener to ensure that a log indicating operator, purpose, time and date be kept aboard, used by operators and reviewed. All operators must have been checked out, be approved by the Fleet Captain and names kept on file by Mrs. Haener. Sound practices of safety and risk management dictate such basic measure.




Secretary/Treasurer's Report

About four months ago this column outlined a plan which would allow us to more easily recognize our guest boats. The time of implementations has come and there have been some questions. With your indulgence, the column of four months ago is repeated below for your consideration. It is timely and the item may help us more easily recognize and greet our guests.

This summer we will try to improve the way we register and greet our guests who arrive by boat. As in the past all guest boats must first register with the Dock Master at the Gas Dock. The Dock Master will have proper forms to record the names, yacht club affiliation, billing address etc. After the proper work (short) is completed the Dock Master will assign a slip to the visiting boat. The Dock Master will also hand a green visitor's identification pennant out of the skipper. We will ask the visiting boat to display the visitor's identification pennant near their bow while they are our guests. The pennant can be hung from the forestay, bow rail, front window or wherever.

Some years ago when the Erie Yacht Club was much smaller everyone knew everybody else. Visiting boats were quite obvious to all. Members regularly greeted guests on a one to one basis. Now that we have grown so large we have lost some of our closeness and our warmth. The green pennant on a boat will identify a guest. We will now have an opportunity to meet some new people and extend our hospitality on a one to one basis. Perhaps we will be able to assist our guests to find groceries or a laundromat. Certainly we can at least extend a hand shake and welcome them.


