an you say "Pocahontas of Mattaponi, daughter of Powhatan"? If you don't remember the real story of Pocahontas, Debbie "White Dove" Custalow Porreco can tell you. And for an in-depth study, you can read "THE TRUE STORY OF POCAHONTAS" by her brother, Dr. Linwood "Little Bear" Custalow. He was the first American Indian to become a doctor in the state of Virginia.

Debbie's adolescence mirrors a place in America where tradition, rituals, pride and heritage occurred and parts of our Country's character was wrought, where school, grades 1-12 were in a 2-room schoolhouse on the Mattaponi Indian Reservation. Debbie attended this school until 6th grade, at which time she entered the community school. After receiving her diploma and recognition as an honor student, Debbie matriculated as a business major and graduated from Chowan College in North Carolina.


Following a stint working at Duke Medical Center, Debbie's brother, Dr. Linwood "Little Bear" Custalow, recruited her to manage his furniture store in VA where she developed her

initial interest in interior decorating and design. Eventually, Debbie relocated to Virginia Beach and was employed by a major furniture store until they relocated 5 years later. Simultaneously, she delivered her first born, Joshua.

Later, she was recruited by the director of flight attendants from Piedmont Airlines / US Air, for whom she flew for ten years. It was during this period of employment that her second son, Jason, was born.

We have all heard about Debbie's portrayal of Pocahontas. She is a descendent of Pocahontas who was born in 1595 in the vicinity near Debbie's birthplace on the Mattaponi Reservation.

In her youth, Debbie "White Dove" portrayed Pocahontas in educational seminars organized by her sister Shirley "Little Dove", the historian for the Mattaponi tribe. From there, she represented Pocahontas in documentaries, filmed by Trans Atlantic Film Co. based in England. Her film works include FOLLOW THE RIVER and TECUMSA, produced by Ted Turner.

Debbie also posed for the statue "Indian Princess - Pocahontas" in Gloucester, VA, erected in 1994. It is considered to be the only authentic depiction of Pocahontas as a youth.

Additionally, Debbie "White Dove" and Shirley "Little Dove" collaborated with Disney for

Debbie "White Dove" and fellow actor Richard Cheatham in Williamsburg, VA with archeologist Bill Kelso who discovered the original 1607 Jamestown colony fort. the animated series POCAHONTAS. Although the portrayal was not historically accurate, it did and does inspire one to explore the story further. By the way, Pocahontas was married to John Rolfe, not John Smith.

Debbie came to Erie, PA nearly 11 years ago; her proudest achievement to date is the recent awarding of a Captain's license and Master's Certificate, fulfilling stringent requirements that included 80 hours of class time, and culminated in 2 comprehensive exams.

The only boating experience that Debbie "White Dove" had was fishing with her Dad. She rowed the boat to put the nets out and retrieve them at the conclusion of their "catch." Because her knowledge of "real" boating was minimal, she was totally exuberant at the prospect of taking the Captain's Course. Debbie discovered that avid boaters filled the classroom and she felt a bit uneasy, but realized she was forging ahead strictly "for the knowledge." Her uneasiness escalated when one class member asked "How is Debbie going to get through


ur Family Jib & Mainsail Division has been very successful because it provides for an inexpensive and very easy means for anyone to get started racing. The Family Jam Division is divided into four classes with new entries being placed in a class of peers based on experience of the owner and crew and the speed potential of the entered boat. The boat with crew is positioned in a class where they generally have a chance in placing high in the results column and the position is adjusted if we have guessed wrong or a boat is somehow dominating a class. This subjective boat placement translates into more racing success and more enjoyment on the water by all of the competitors. This is a departure from the hard line rating brake in class division as seen with standard racing fleets throughout the world wide racing community.

All Family JAM boats are assigned free of charge a handicap based on a standard sister ship's spinnaker PHRF-Lake Erie rating. Rating certificates are not required, however are encouraged by the fact that those boats with a current certificate will see a slight improvement in their time allowance.

Cheap! First time racers new to racing and the EYCRF are enticed by a very minimal \$25 entry fee for their initial racing season that includes 23 races and many parties and events for the 2007 season. The hope is that each new entry and crew will get hooked and return to race season after season.

One of twelve EYCRF's "End of a Series" crew parties on the deck with great food, great beer and great fun all "made easy" with great sailboat racing.






Easy! The Wednesday evening races start and finish 100 yards from our Club entrance off our own lighthouse and pavilion. The beautiful newly roofed lighthouse deck is not only convenient for the race committee and interested spectators but also offers a prime site for photographers capturing the start and finish. The Lighthouse deck and the Club House deck also offer great venues for the many free post race parties and awards presentations held by the fleet.

Bonus! ALL racers who do not place in the top three positions in a race score a bonus in that those three boats who do place first, second or third in class loose nine, six and three seconds respectively in their time adjustment. This adjustment is cumulative for the entire season so more racers in an individual class have an increasing chance of success in their group as the season advances. This dynamic cumulative penalty for the winners is unique to our own Racing Fleet and is another departure from the normal world of sailboat racing.




ESCAPADE, according to the ABC Wide World of Sports television show, was a 70-foot sailing yacht chartered by an Erie Yacht Club Past Commodore Bob Way and his wife Peggy with a crew of "fresh water sailors", including step-daughter Roberta, who, among other adventures, broke the standing 20-year time record for a race from Miami, Florida to Lacaya, Grand Bahamas in the Caribbean.

ESCAPADE, according to Mr. Webster's book, is an escape from restraint or confinement. For 25 years Roberta Rey, daughter of Peg Way and Doug Yetman, performed this and other illusions nightly in the magical USO/Las Vegas style show "World of Illusion", entertaining both the armed forces and civilians in over 50 countries and all 50 states. Roberta continued her magic career as part of a magical revue at the Fantasy Springs Casino in Palm Springs, California where she also ran a suc-

cessful Magic Shoppe in a building she shared with Bob Way's Bicycle Shop. Now there was a man who always wanted to know "How did they do that. Roberta?"

ESCAPADE according to magical historians and others "in-the-know" was an international magic show featuring Carl R. "Carlton" Beck. Carlton's dynamic and powerful performances of large scale illusions and exotic wild animals wowed audiences from Las Vegas to the Sultans of Southeast Asia.

Now we have another ESCAPADE coming to make its home right here in Erie, The International Magic Hall of Fame and Museum. Enter international illusionist Carlton Beck with a dream to provide a place to preserve, protect, educate and most importantly offer live entertainment in the timeless art of magic. "With all the incredible assets in the area and being the birthplace of Harry Kellar, Erie is simply the most logical location for The International

Magic Hall of Fame & Museum to be located in," smiles Beck. Carlton believes that magic should surprise, amaze and mystify, but above all, it must entertain. "The presentation is every bit as important as are the illusions." Carlton says. He has been promoting his magic for many years by escaping from straight jackets while suspended over alligators, sunk deep in rivers and lakes in a steel box that's locked and chained, also handcuffed and placed in a box while suspended over 100 feet above the ground. All of which made believers out of the onlookers as he escaped during an accidental moment in which the box somehow dislodged from the Crane hoisting it and dropped to the ground. As a hush fell over the audience an ambulance immediately rushed to the scene with the driver quickly stepping out and waving to an amazed audience ... because it was none other than Carlton!

But why here in Erie, PA? Why build this

grand edifice in Erie? First of all, this town has always been "a little Eerie". Erie does have a secret but we will break the "magic code of silence" and reveal the truth to our LOG readers. The secret is that one Mr. Harry Kellar, a native of Erie and whose descendents still live here, is internationally known as the 1st Great American Magician. In fact Erich Weiss, better known as Harry Houdini, took the first name Harry out of respect for his mentor Harry Kellar.

In the early part of the 1900's, a few performers were recognized by just a single name Houdini, Thurston, and Kellar as is the way we refer today to Cher, Prince and Madonna. Kellar so defined the smooth, warm yet all powerful image of a magician that author Frank Baum based his Wizard of Oz character on having Kellar in mind and even payed Harry for the tribute. Kellar wore the mantle of "Greatest American Magician", an honor granted to magicians by magicians. This mantle has since past down twice now resting on the shoulders of Master Magician Lance Burton.

Everybody loves magic. In fact for those seriously addicted there are two major international magic organizations. The Society of American Magicians (SAM) is the oldest and most prestigious. Harry Kellar was the first president of SAM and his long time friend and student Harry Houdini was the second. The other organization is the International Brotherhood of Magicians (IBM). Roberta Rey is Past President of local ring 291 in Palms Springs, California. Together, just these two organizations, number over 50,000 members worldwide with their web sites translated into nine languages. The organizations represent amateur, professional, design and manufacturers, magic dealers, book authors and magic collectors. Some collectors have paid as much as \$10,000 for original magic posters.

Literally millions of people from around the globe will make a pilgrimage to the Magic Hall

of Fame. The idea of being able to take a walk around an illusion set-up like sawing a woman in half or stretching her beautiful form into a goddess only to see her float away while being entertained by a fantastic magic show is all the incentive visitors needed.

The International Magic Hall of Fame & Museum has been "wholeheartedly" endorsed by both Erie County Executive Mark DiVecchio and Erie Mayor Joe Sinnot. Lance Burton stated "Carlton Beck has been my good friend for 24 years. He is recognized by his peers as one of the great stage illusionists of our time. His latest project, The International Magic Hall of Fame & Museum, is an exciting development. I believe it will be the crowning achievement in his long and illustrious career. I feel confident it will be something all magicians around the world will welcome with pride."

Co-author Roberta Rey made the return move from Palm Spring to Erie. She was excited to see the progressive changes here in stating, "The Warner Theatre Restoration, the Sea Wolves, a city alive with dining, festivals and musical events, our new convention center along with the international appeal of the casino, great shopping centers and seven miles of beautiful sandy beaches make Erie the absolute perfect location for the Magic Hall of Fame complex". She continued, "I heard about this project, sought out Carlton and asked him how can I help?"

While 3 term president of IBM Ring 291, coauthor Roberta Rey was chair of a committee that honored Karrell Fox, magician and mentor to many magicians like Siegfried and Roy and Lance Burton. Rey awarded him a bronze star on the Palm Springs "Walk of Fame".



The Magic Hall of Fame Museum will feature a vast array of extraordinarily exquisite exhibits from all over the world as well. For instance, Mr. Ken Klosterman of Loveland, Ohio and founder of the Klosterman Bakery organization, holds one of the largest private collections of magical history in the world and plans to donate to the museum.

Magical performances are most common-

Years ago, during our high water era, I was at the Club on the east side of the north wall when I noticed what I thought was a new type of seagull since it was hanging around the other gulls. Luckily I had one of my 35mm cameras with me and a telephoto lens so I was able to captured two photos used in this article.

I never really thought about those photos until a few weeks ago when I was going through some of my old photographs for another potential LOG article. With a little time and research I was able to find out that the bird I photographed, some 20 or 30 years ago, was in fact an Arctic Tern. So I said to myself, "hey self" write an article about these unique little world travelers thinking you LOG readers might be interested in a few facts about this rather remarkable bird.

The Arctic Tern (Sterna paradisaea) is a seabird of the tern family Sternidae. This bird has a circumpolar distribution, breeding colonially in Arctic and sub-Arctic regions of Europe, Asia, and North America. The species is strongly migratory, seeing two summers each year as it migrates from its northern breeding grounds to the oceans around Antarctica and back each year. This is the longest regular migration by any known animal.



Arctic Terns are medium-sized birds, with a length of 33-39 centimeters (13-15 in) and a wingspan of 76-85 cm (26-30 in). They are mainly grey and white plumaged, with a red beak (as long as the head, straight, with pronounced gonys) and feet, white forehead, a black-nape and crown (streaked white), and white cheeks. The upper wing is gray with a white leading edge, and the collar is completely white, as is the rump. The deeply forked tail is whitish, with grey outer webs.

The Arctic Tern is K-selected, caring for and aggressively defending a small number of young. Parents feed them fish for a considerable time, and help them fly south to winter.

Arctic Terns are long-lived birds, with many reaching twenty years of age. They eat mainly fish and small marine invertebrates. The species is abundant, with an estimated one million individuals. While the trend in the number of individuals in the species as a whole is not

known, exploitation in the past has reduced this bird's numbers in the southern reaches of its range.

The Arctic Tern has a worldwide, circumpolar breeding distribution which is continuous; there are no recognized subspecies. It can be found in coastal regions in cooler temperate parts of North America and Eurasia during the northern summer. While wintering during the southern summer, it can be found at sea, reaching the southern edge of the Antarctic ice. The area of the range of the species is approximately ten million square kilometers.



Famous for its migration, the Arctic Tern flies from its Arctic breeding grounds to the Antarctic and back again each year. This 12,000mile journey ensures that this bird sees two summers per year and more daylight than any other creature on the planet. The average Arctic Tern in its life will travel a distance equal to going to the moon and back. One example of this bird's remarkable long-distance flying abilities involves an Arctic Tern tagged as an unfledged chick on the Farne Islands, Northumberland, UK in summer 1982, which reached Melbourne, Australia in October 1982, a sea journey of over 14,000 miles in just three months. Another example is that of a chick tagged in Labrador in July 1928 and found in South Africa four months later. Since Arctic Terns usually migrate far offshore they are rarely seen from land outside the breeding season. So the photographs that I shot off the north wall (upper left & lower right) are something of a rarity for this area of the world.

Arctic Terns mate for life, unlike modern man, and in most cases, return to the same colony each year. Breeding begins around the third or fourth year. Courtship is elaborate, especially in birds nesting for the first time, now that is more like modern man. Courtship begins with a so-called "high flight", where a female will chase the male to a high altitude and then slowly descend. This display is followed by "fish flights", where the male will offer fish to the female. Courtship on the ground involves strutting with a raised tail and lowered wings, after which both birds will usually fly around and circle each other. Both sexes agree on a site for a nest, and both will defend the site. During this time, the male continues to feed the female, then the mating begins shortly thereafter ... sound familiar? Breeding

takes place in colonies on coasts, islands and occasionally inland on tundra near water. It lays from one to three eggs per clutch, most often two.



The diet of the Arctic Tern varies depending on location and time, but is usually carnivorous eating small fish or marine crustaceans. Fish species comprise the most important part of their diet yet sometimes, these birds also eat mollusks, marine worms or berries, and on their northern breeding grounds, insects.

Like all Sterna terns, the Arctic Tern feeds by plunge-diving for fish, usually from the sea, though occasionally also fishing in coastal freshwater lagoons. It often dives from a "stepped-hover", in which it slowly flies into the wind at such a speed that it is stationary relative to the water. It will then dive and catch its prey, which it detects by sight. Arctic Terns sometimes dip down to the surface of the water to catch prey close to the surface. They may also chase insects in the air when breeding. It is also thought that Arctic Terns may, in




spite of their small size, occasionally engage in "kleptoparasitism" by swooping at birds so as to startle them into releasing their catches.

While feeding, skuas, gulls, and other tern species will often harass other birds and steal their food. They often form mixed colonies with other terns, such as Common and Sandwich Terns.

Arctic Terns are a truly unique bird species. So next time you catch a glimpse of one, just stop and think that you are looking at the most well traveled animal species on earth, second only to man.



It's hard to believe that we're already thinking about the 2008 boating season before we've even put the 2007 season behind us, but it's true.

In the last week of September, the Club will mail out the 2008 application forms to the membership. Please take the time to read the cover letter for any special announcements. The 2008 Dock Committee will have their first meeting in November to assign all slips that are open as the result of non-returned slip applications.

The committee wishes to thank all members for their continued cooperation during this period of construction and would like to remind everyone that plans are reviewed for as little disruption as possible.

The vessel: *Eyerly*, a 1982 Beneteau First 42. Conditions: Downwind, heavy seas and chute up with a starboard pole which is alternately skimming the waters on starboard with the boom prevented to port and tipping the waves to port. We would have preferred that the thing was down but it was up and we were hoping for the best. We had survived a few roundups (which were really common that day in the fleet) and were at least ahead of the boats which we could and should be ahead of.

Onboard were my son, Will Dunn, at the helm (very experienced), Jeremy Lincoln on foredeck (very experienced), my son, Tommy Dunn, on the Spinnaker sheet (years of experience at that post), Will's wife (a lovely girl from Fort Worth, Texas – need I say more?), and poor Tim McNair. Tim had left his car in Buffalo earlier in the week and was simply looking for a ride from Colburn to Buffalo inasmuch as his vessel had headed back to Erie on this ominous day. He had never sailed with us before. Little did Tim know what lay ahead.

At this point, I must tell you that I have always tried to reassure those who fear that a sailboat might tip over. You know the type that gets white knuckles, turns green and who knows what else at the moment when a sailboat heels even a little bit. I always have prided myself in



my reassurance to these unseasoned mariners that sailboats with a keel simply don't tip over. The more they heel, the more leverage that lead keel has. The more they heel, the less leverage those sails have as the wind blows over the top of them. Then you have those sheets you can release and that helm that can take you into the wind which can be very noisy but leave you less in harms way. Invariably I have ended these reassurances with a statement to the effect that "oh sure, it is possible to tip a sailboat over but you'd have to be an idiot to do it".

Meanwhile, back to the story at hand where there were in fact white knuckles, green faces and ominous feelings on board (including those of yours truly). Others were getting their chutes down and a boat nearby suffered a Kevlar main blowout but *Eyerly* trucked on until, well, until an as yet undiagnosed combination of putting the starboard pole well into the water and most likely one of the ten footers coming from the port quarter forced Eyerly not only to have its chute under water to starboard but also into a involuntary jibe. The problem was severely complicated by the fact that the boom was prevented to port and someone had put the preventer on upside down so that it could not be eased. Normally the jam cleat which would have released the preventer is on the boom end of the preventer and you

nto the sky doing a another perfect "figure eight".

pull the preventer sheet upward to release the jam cleat. This time the jam cleat was on the rail and you had to pull its sheet downward to ease but it could not be done because downward was into the deck and there simply was no room to ease it.

The result was a situation which certainly Everly had never been in. We had the approximate 20 knots of wind coming onto the port side of our main but it was prevented to the port rail which by itself had the starboard rail about four feet under. This does not take into consideration the fact that our Spinnaker pole to starboard was about six feet under water. Tommy on the starboard rail with the Spinnaker sheet had water above his waist and as he looked at me as I clung to a starboard secondary winch running the guy with water up to my neck, I simply said, "whatever you do, don't let go of the sheet" because that was the only thing keeping him on board. Jeremy was calmly trying to release the preventer (and he knew enough to ease if he could release it) but it would not budge. My daughter-in-law and Tim McNair did not panic and were testing their Topsiders on what were normally vertical surfaces. At this moment, Dave Haller and his Beneteau 37.7 (whom we had been very proud to have been leading on this leg) sailed by and he and my son, William, exchanged an old familiar line of Dave's: "Are we having fun yet?". Well, amazingly enough, we were having fun. It was a beautiful day. *Eyerly* was in a very strange predicament but the water was not quite flowing through the companion way to the below decks nor was it flowing in an open port in the starboard side of the cockpit (we had at least a couple inches to spare). and Lake Erie was warm. *Eyerly* was totally stopped. We were basically "hove to". Nobody panicked and there we were. The boat was on her side and yours truly after his many pronouncements about heeling boats felt like nothing other than ... you guessed it ... an idiot!




This is *Eyerly* in a calmer more resplendent pose while being in concert with the days more resplendent wind conditions.

I had found a way to tip a keel sailboat over.

We managed to get the chute down (I should say on board) from the water to the deck. This relieved whatever it was contributing to our dilemma. However, the main alone, jibed as it was and pinned into the wind, still had *Eyerly* more on her side than her bottom. We finally were successful in releasing the preventer about one inch at a time (remember it needed to be eased anyway). We eventually eased it sufficiently to get on our bottom and hoist ... well ... a headsail for a more conservative finish of our ride to Buffalo.

I since have re-rigged my preventer so it cannot be deployed "upside down" and am proud to report that *Eyerly* has been sailing on her bottom ever since. Tim McNair still speaks to me and I no longer use that "you'd have to be an idiot" line in explaining why keel boats don't tip over.

He looked at me closely and then asked, "What did you teach?"







mal schedule begins on Sunday, September 9th so be here ... you'll love it!



# Choose One... "Freeze Tag" or "Fishing"?

The great thing about boating is its flexibility. It's not like other hobbies, such as bird watching, tiddily winks, or freeze tag. It's much more versatile. Some boaters prefer to spend their time moored to the dock; others don scuba gear and plunge into Lake Erie's icy depths searching for lost artifacts of the past. Still others use their boat to fish.

Despite moving up to larger boats and a cruising-and-loafing-around style of boating, I yearn for the days of rolling around Lake Erie in quest of the mighty walleye and small mouth bass. To satisfy this occasional thirst, I once bought a second boat that enabled me to fill this desire.

I really can't call myself a true fisherman though. After all, I don't have thousands of dollars tied up in gear or mounted fish heads hanging in my liv-

ing room. I

don't even subscribe to any of the trendy fishing magazines. Yet I do enjoy rolling around Lake Erie fishing. The problem is some of the friends I go fishing with are true worm-in-the-shoe fishermen.



Should you require the proper forms to start the application process or have any questions concerning the Membership Rewards Program please contact the Club office.










## A POEM FOR THOSE OVER...



The goal of the program was to teach the instructors how to recognize bullying, how to address it, and ultimately how to prevent it.


The presenters from the Ophelia Project, Maureen Dunn and Caley Doran, led an informative and interactive discussion with lots of fun hands-on activities. They talked about how relational aggression and bullying is often non-physical and can be done in an emotional way, which is far more subtle and difficult to discern. Maureen and Caley did a mock tugof-war game with the instructors to show how the negative dynamics of bullying work and how to change the balance back in a positive way.

"I think we all got something important out of the class that we have been able to apply this summer," said Pat Bloomstine, who is the head instructor for the Reyburn Sailing School. He added, "They did some team building activities with us that I'd really like to do with the kids on a day when we can't get out on the water."

Caitlin Niemic, another instructor who took part in the seminar explained that their first aim is to avoid any problems to begin with. "We do activities to get the kids to know and relate to one another," she said. "We always start with a name game where the kids give their name and something they like, such as a favorite ice cream flavor."

Caitlin adds, "But situations do come up sometimes. And I think we are able to handle them better now."
